


It is time to write a letter to the government, to tell them that we can use other celebrations to replace fireworks for special events. Everybody should stop the government to set up fireworks!!

Religious Studies? What a subject!



ou can hear the sound of chattering from far away during this lesson, see students chatting non-stop and doing their own things. The teacher and students talk at the same time. This is the lesson of Religious Studies (RS). Should RS even be taught at school?

The major reason to not teach RS in school is because not everyone is religious. According to the US Department of State's 2008 Religious Freedom Report, only 20% of the Hong Kong population is religious. And for the 80% who is not religious, schools are forcing them to believe in a certain religion instead of teaching it as knowledge. According to Article 23 of the Hong Kong Basic Law, we all have the freedom of religious belief. It is important to have freedom in religious belief so that we can have independent thinking -- the basic need of a free society. Teaching RS in school contradicts with our freedom of belief because it doesn't give you freedom to choose your religion. In my class, the teacher says that she is not forcing us to believe in Jesus, but then she comes back and says "if you don't believe in Jesus, you will go to hell." Ironic, isn't it? Other students who have a different religion may feel isolated because another religion is imposed on them. Therefore, it will be more difficult for them to do well in this subject. Schools should be neutral in religious beliefs and not impose religion on students.

Another reason to not teach religion at schools is because schools should educate students about things that are useful, such as Chinese, English and Math. RS is not practical because you seldom use it in your daily lives except if you want to be a priest. Also, the way of teaching is not practical because nobody wants to be told how to think and what they should believe in. When non-religious students or students of different faiths resist the beliefs taught in RS, they will not pay attention in class. At the end, schools won't achieve what they want in teaching RS. I believe that parents are

responsible for their kids' religious beliefs. If students want to learn about RS, they can go to Sunday schools or parents can teach their kids at home. I feel more comfortable to learn religious beliefs from people who are closest to me.

Some may argue that teaching religion is important because students can develop positive morals and values. Students can build a moral framework from parents and other subjects. During our class, we don't really use the bible, there's no bible reading or anything interesting. The teacher gives us some worksheets and everyone waits until she checks the answers and just copies them down. That is what RS is about, doing worksheets in class and talking with classmates. Students can't actually learn anything useful in Religious Studies lesson. According to a research report from Tennessee Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations dated January 2003, there is correlation between the adequacy of a school facility

and student behavior and performance. In general, students attending school in newer, better facilities score five to seventeen points higher on standardized tests than those attending in substandard buildings.

Some people believe that upgrading their school facilities is unnecessary. They think that schools don't have enough space to add more facilities. They believe schools don't have enough money to improve their facilities. However, I believe if schools want students to study well, they can try to get donation from different types of fundraising events. These include walkathon, fun fair and variety shows. They can target the government and alumni for subsidies and donations to buy more land to build the facilities or to buy more equipment.

So should schools upgrade their facilities? Tell your class representative or write a letter to the Student Association. You can also tell your parents to go to PTA meetings and tell the teachers and principal of your needs.



The reason why New York succeeded in introducing cycling is because they added bicycle lanes that reached everywhere. At a May 2009 conference, a Civil Engineering and Development Department official explained the government's plan on cycle track network in the New Territories to increase the recreational value. Transport Department representative shared his view on recent trends of bicycle accidents in Hong Kong refereeing to accident statistics and their effort in promoting bicycling safety through education and publicity. Other speakers pointed out that the government sees cycling as a recreational activity instead of a regular transport mode. In Hong Kong, there are restrictions on cycling at parks, on roads and at other locations. To cyclists, that is very upsetting. Should the government add more bicycle lanes to roads so that no matter where we cycle we will still be safe?

"Bicycles are so inconvenient! They are too small to carry goods around!" "They are tiring and uncomfortable when you ride them for too long." These may be your complaints. But not anymore! In this decade, people have been inventing new bicycles. There are bicycles that use electricity that are faster and more comfortable. Bicycles nowadays can also carry cargos as they have very long tails that allow you to put a few boxes on them. It is also possible to have an electrifying cargo bike that allows you to carry the cargos in a much easier way. I also believe that bicycles are much cheaper than cars.
