Topical Program G1-6

Through experiential learning and meeting with our network of guest speakers, students practice critical thinking, creativity and interviewing skills in a project-based environment. Topics are carefully chosen to broaden students' perspectives and build social awareness.

WEEK I: BE A MUSIC PRODUCER July 8-12





Topic: Music Production

Guest Speaker: Kreative Studio http://kreativestudio.org/ will be co-facilitating this program and host the students at their music studio in Lan Kwai Fong.

Field Trip: Visit the music studio and record your own sound!

Overview: Students will have the rare opportunity to work in every aspect of music production from conception to recording. After spending a few classroom sessions discussing the lyricism, musical genres and interviewing a professional music producer, students will get a chance to visit a recording studio and lend their voices to an original CD recording.

WEEK 2: BE AN ANIMATION FILMMAKER July 15-19





Topic: Lego Stop-Motion Film-making

Guest Speaker: Senior instructor from Children's Technology Workshop

Overview: What could be more exciting than turning your original story idea into an actual film using Legos! Students will begin by collaborating to compose a thoughtful and dynamic story board before constructing and filming their very own stop-motion short frame-by-frame under the guidance of an experienced animation filmmaker.

WEEK 3: BE A PHOTOGRAPHER July 22-26



Topic: Photography

Field Trip: Walking tour of Causeway Bay to snap photos for our portfolios.

Overview: Photography involves much more than a simple point and click. In this class students will explore the concepts of composition and perspective as they discover exactly how a camera works by constructing their very own pin-hole camera and head out into the streets of Hong Kong to translate this dynamic city into artwork from their own perspective!

WEEK 4: MEET THE HEAD CHEF July 29-Aug 2





Topic: Cooking and Nutrition

Field Trip: Visit Secret Ingredient's private kitchen in Sheung Wan to meet their head chef and take a cooking class under his direction! Secret Ingredient http://secretingredient.com.hk, delivers locally produced, fresh ingredients and recipes to homes so that meals can be prepared efficiently and healthily.

Overview: We believe that cooking skills and good eating habits should be nurtured at a young age! In SI's private kitchen, students will be involved with measuring ingredients, exploring how textures and tastes change and presenting food in artistic ways. They will learn where healthy ingredients come from before getting their "hands dirty" to create delicious and heathy canapes, pizza, yogurt and dessert.

WEEK 5: MEET THE ANIMAL RESCUERS Aug 5-9





Topic: Animal Rights - Pet-care as a social responsibility

Field Trip: Visit the SPCA, http://scpa.org.hk, site in Wan Chai and meet the animals!

Overview: Students discuss various issues and challenges facing pets and animals today. They will learn that pet ownership does not equate to toy ownership and even touches on animal conservation for endangered species. These classroom-based lessons will be reinforced by a trip to the SPCA in Wan Chai where the class will participate in a special presentation: "Respect for life begins with concern for animals", that will not only discuss animals and how to take care of them, but also about the animals' needs, some important considerations before homing a pet and the welfare of animals.

WEEK 6: MEET THE ACTORS Aug 12-16





Topic: Drama - Theory and practice

Guest Speakers: Shadow Players acting troupe, http://hkshadowplayers.com, will be visiting the classroom and directing various improvisational and acting exercises with our young thespians!

Overview: Our summer topical program will end on a high note as our theater and silver-screen hopefuls learn about the history of theater before putting their dramatical talent to work in fun acting exercises and workshops led by a local Hong Kong acting troupe. Students will not only act out short scenes but will discuss the importance of projection, dramatization and staging before putting on a mini production!

Our weekly 5-day workshops provide a meaningful base in preparation for our Writing Foundation courses! Your little learners will engage in fun topics that open their eyes to the world around them while building confidence in speaking and developing knowledge in phonics, writing ability, creativity and collaboration skills.

WEEK I: AROUND THE WORLD IN 5 DAYS July 15-19



Little ones are naturally and intuitively eager to explore new places and ideas. Children will discuss and contrast the diversity this world has to offer – people, places and cultures – and inquire how we can take part in a global community. As the concept of diversity is introduced, students understand their roles as global citizens of the Earth.

WEEK 2: SUMMER STORY LAND July 22-26

"Once upon a time..." With stories as inspiration, children make sense of their worlds and understand how people relate to one another. Our little readers will be introduced to classic and modern stories that teach them important morals and values that strengthen their various developmental skills.



WEEK 3: MANNERS MATTER July 29-Aug 2



What does having good etiquette mean? From telephone calls to proper table manners, how should we behave in public, in the classroom or at someone else's house? Learn and practice respectful manners through situational role play, story reading and other engaging activities. Common courtesy paves the way for positive interactions, good relationships and social success.

WEEK 4: AFRICAN SAFARI Aug 5-9

Join us for a thrilling expedition deep into the African continent where we will meet lions and cheetahs and so much more! Our miniature explorers will learn about animal conservation while discussing the different components of the African eco-system and how the animals thrive in such an exotic world!

PSAT & SAT Program

SAT Critical Reading & Writing Approach

- Builds **textual analysis skills**, **vocabulary** and **grammar** that are critical to ace critical reading and writing sections.
- Teaches key strategies such as understanding common question types, how to avoid typical SAT question traps and effectively narrow down answer choices.
- Improves essay scores by teaching students the **specific style** and **grading criteria** for the SAT essay. Students will have extensive opportunities to **practice writing** and **receive feedback**.

SAT Math Approach
